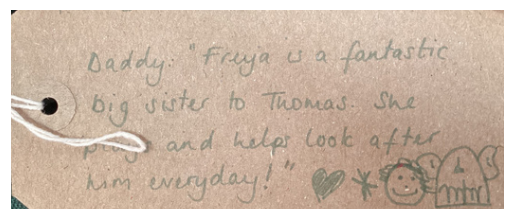
Parents' Evening

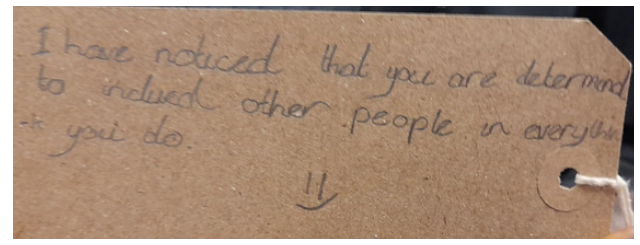
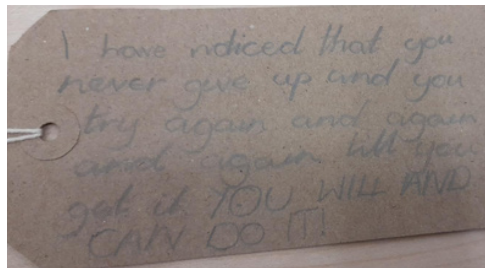

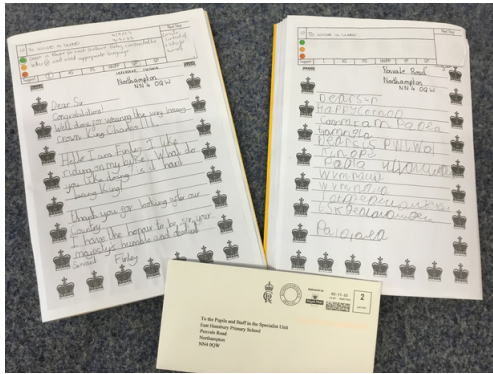

King's Letter

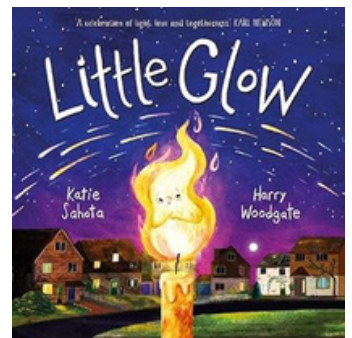

Roles of our Young Leaders



Reading Ambassadors

Reading Ambassadors have a very important role in school. A Reading Ambassador is someone who loves to read, reads different genres and authors, enjoys sharing books and stories with others, as well as being creative. Our Reading Ambassadors are led by Mrs DeChastelain.

Their main roles are to:




- Promote a love of reading across the school.
- Organise a range of book themed activities over the year such as: World Book Day, 100 Reads assemblies and support our annual RED October
- Display books beautifully throughout the school
- Write a termly reading newsletter
- Attend weekly meetings and share vital reading information with the school community

Ministers Part of our School Parliament



Our ministers are like our Senior Leadership team but with children. They will help make some very important decisions across the school. Each minister has a special role alongside helping Mrs Pennington with and please see some of their duties below.

- **Prime Minister** – Mrs Robinson and Mrs Kelly- the main contact for the parliament, organises the time and place of the meetings
- **Speaker of the House** - begins the meetings, announces the agenda and speaks in assembly. 
- **Secretary** - Takes attendance, records the minutes and sends out correspondence when needed
- **Ministers of the Environment** - responsible for recycling, rubbish clean up and events such as 'lights off days'.
- **Ministers of Education** - create a 'wall of fame', conduct student surveys and organise the displays.
- **Ministers of Community** - helps to organise community events.
- **Ministers of Enrichment** - promotes and suggests clubs and activities reflecting the children's interests
- **Ministers for Inclusion** – promotes inclusion throughout the school, suggests opportunities and events

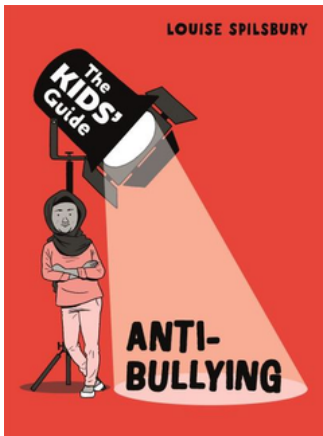
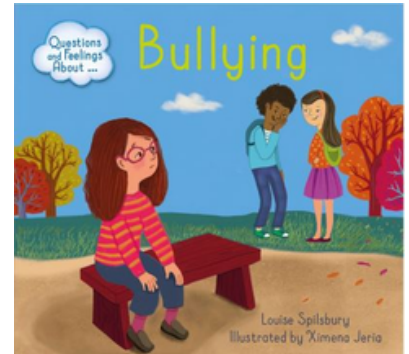
ANTI BULLYING WEEK

This is a great book to introduce the topic of bullying to young children. It explains simply what the term actually means. A picture book about bullying, helping children to recognise it and know what to do about it.

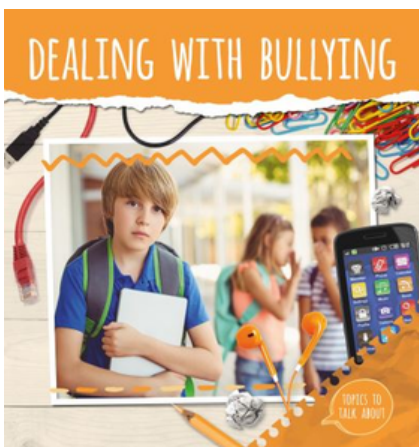
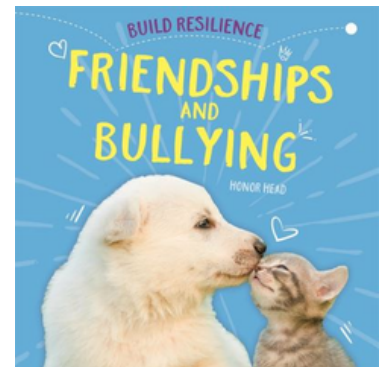


ANTI-BULLYING BY LOUISE SPILSBURY AND SCOTT GARRETT (ILLUSTRATOR)

Age appropriate practical advice, explaining many aspects and different things that children might experience with bullying.

FRIENDSHIPS AND BULLYING BY HONOR HEAD

Very cute animals illustrate each scenario to help young readers understand: why friends are good for you, how to make friends, why sometimes people are unfriendly and how to spot and stop bullying. Readers are asked to think about how those scenarios might relate to their experiences and then encouraged to have a go, ask for help, be brave and to embrace feelings of nervousness as well as enjoying feelings of pride or happiness.



DEALING WITH BULLYING BY HOLLY DUHIG

Explores the emotions and issues that a child may experience if they are being bullied.



TURN AWAY FROM TEASING BY GILL HASSON AND SARAH JENNINGS (ILLUSTRATOR)

This book suggests what a child can do if they're being teased, it suggests what children can do if they see someone else being teased, and it talks to the child who might be teasing others.

E-Safety



What Parents & Carers Need to Know about SMART TVs

Smart TVs connect to the internet without the need for a set-top box or streaming device, letting users access a range of features through the TV set itself. From on-demand content apps like BBC iPlayer to streaming services such as Netflix, as well as connecting to smartphones and other wireless devices. Most new televisions are internet enabled – so whether you're thinking of upgrading your home-viewing system or buying an additional TV for your child's room, it's now even more important to consider the online safety aspects.

WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

- AGE-INAPPROPRIATE CONTENT**
From Netflix to Disney+ to Prime Video, there is a plethora of streaming services available. While these services offer content catering for younger viewers, they also provide material for more mature audiences. If you don't have parental controls set up on your accounts, your child could find themselves being exposed to shows and movies with adult themes, strong language and violence.
- INCREASED SCREEN TIME**
The array of content available through smart TVs could lead to your child spending excessive amounts of time in front of the screen. Not only can prolonged screen time distract from important activities such as schoolwork or exercise, but experts have also warned that excessive hours in front of the box can lead to health problems including obesity, poor sleeping patterns and depression.
- REMOTE-CONTROL RETAIL**
Use many online devices, smart TVs facilitate digital purchases. Buying a new app or the latest season of a favourite show, for example. If your child has access to a bank card and isn't restricted by spending controls on the system, they could run up a sizeable bill through a smart TV fairly quickly – especially if they're not quite old enough to fully appreciate the value of money.
- UNCONVINCING SECURITY**
As Internet of Things (IoT) devices, smart TVs can be uniquely that internet-enabled TVs benefit to support high-level security programmes like you adjust a phone or computer. Being targeted by hackers could be dangerous, as well as putting their personal data at risk.
- A SILENT SPY?**
Some smart TVs already collect data on user's viewing habits and then display targeted advertising based on that personal information – while there have also been reports of internet-enabled TVs (and the apps installed on them) being used to intercept sensitive information with a built-in microphone (for voice activation). Third parties could potentially listen in on someone's home life.
- CONTACT FROM STRANGERS**
Many smart TVs can be used for web browsing, social media and live streaming – all of which could allow unknown users to contact your child (or vice versa). If your child engages with these functions of their TV, a stranger could potentially discover their contact information and potentially then use it to send more sensitive personal details, such as your home address.

Advice for Parents & Carers

- MAKE IT A FAMILY THING**
Family TV time is a great way to model the responsible enjoyment of technology – showing your child how to use the smart TV safely for when they're old enough to watch it independently. You could also take this opportunity to establish some healthy TV boundaries, such as time limits on their daily viewing or how to make sure they're only watching content that's appropriate for their age.
- CREATE CHILD PROFILES**
Much like with smartphones and tablets, apps can be downloaded onto smart TVs from free content platforms such as BBC iPlayer to paid-for services like Prime Video. Most of these apps allow you to create a separate account for your child which has different settings to your own – suggesting more child-friendly material and reducing the possibility of their viewing explicit content.
- SET UP PARENTAL CONTROLS**
It's likely that your smart TV has built-in parental controls, which not only let you filter out age-inappropriate shows, movies and games but can also restrict in-app purchasing, so your child can't accidentally spend money through the device. When you've enabled these safeguards, have an open conversation with your child about the reasons, helping them to understand the potential risks.
- CONSIDER THE LOCATION**
If you're concerned about the online safety hazards that a smart TV might pose to your child, you could consider where in your home you put the device. The safest option would be to place the smart TV in a shared family space – so that an adult is usually nearby and able to supervise while your child's watching it – rather than in the relative privacy of a bedroom.

What Parents & Carers Need to Know about X

In October 2022, the enormously popular social media network Twitter was purchased by tech tycoon Elon Musk. That sparked a host of changes to the platform – not all which have been received positively by its fans. The alterations have continued with each passing month, many of them raising online safety concerns among the 550 million users of Twitter (now rebranded as simply X). With further adjustments reportedly in the pipeline, X has attracted more than its usual share of controversy and caution in recent times.

WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

- A BLOCK ON BLOCKING**
X has announced plans to remove its blocking feature. Previously, this stopped other users from seeing your profile or sending you direct messages, while also hiding their posts from your feed. Only this latter function will now remain. The decision has been criticised by some members, who fear that it will promote doxxing and harassment.
- AGE-INAPPROPRIATE CONTENT**
Many of X's less age-appropriate posts can feature anything from extreme political views to pornography. While accounts marked as 18+ are restricted from non-18+ users, it's still fairly easy to stumble across this material accidentally. X's new 'For You' page also shows content from accounts that a user doesn't already follow – meaning that almost anything could end up on a child's feed.
- LIMITED REPORTING FEATURES**
X offers a premium membership with some functionality (such as content that can view and reply to your posts) increasingly being made exclusive to those who pay the subscription fee. Several commentators have speculated that X could one day become an exclusive playground for service, with access to accounts being revoked for anyone unwilling or unable to take out a subscription.
- VERIFICATION FOR SALE**
Historically, Twitter's moderators printed account verification on the platform. While it might be exciting if celebrity and other notable accounts could find this swiftness, many young people could find this unsettling. Emphasise that, if your child encounters someone appearing to be on X, it's best not to give that person what they want: an argument, ignore them, make their account and move on.

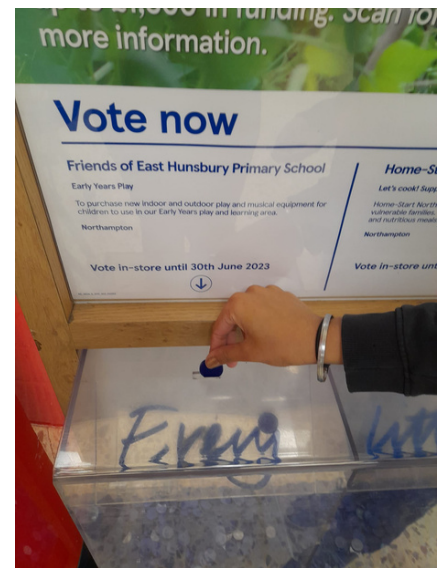
Advice for Parents & Carers

- PROTECT PRIVACY**
Unsavory characters may try to gain access to using a person's X account to view their posts and gather information on them, or to contact them. Encourage your child to ensure the account has a strong password and enable the 'Protect Your Profile' feature (in the account settings), so that strangers can't view your child's posts without first being approved as a follower.
- DON'T RISE TO THE BAIT**
To gain more views and followers, some X users post deliberately inflammatory comments on sensitive topics such as race, sexual orientation and gender issues. Many young people could find this upsetting. Emphasise that, if your child encounters someone appearing to be on X, it's best not to give that person what they want: an argument, ignore them, make their account and move on.
- STAY ALERT FOR IMPOSTERS**
Make sure your child understands that X's blue ticks no longer guarantee the identity of anyone on the platform. While it might be exciting if celebrity and other notable accounts could find this swiftness, many young people could find this unsettling. Emphasise that, if your child encounters someone appearing to be on X, it's best not to give that person what they want: an argument, ignore them, make their account and move on.
- ONLY FOLLOW TRUSTED ACCOUNTS**
Using the 'Following' tab on X helps to ensure that the only content your child sees has come from accounts they've chosen to follow. This also restricts the content of X to messages and explicit content. Show your child how to report another user's account if they think they're behaving inappropriately by spreading misinformation or offensive opinions.
- BE READY TO TAKE ACTION**
If your child suffers harassment on the platform or becomes the target of a hack, you could consider deactivating their account temporarily. However, X's safety features have been criticised for allowing falling to protect users' wellbeing – so if your child is being subjected to abusive messages or similar with intent on the platform, it might be prudent to remove them from X altogether.

Lost Property

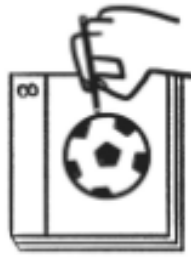
