Antibullying assembly and creative competition

This week started with an assembly led by Mrs Roberts all about anti-bullying to follow up from anti-bullying week last week when we wore our odd socks. At EHPS, we do not tolerate bullying in any form and will always endeavour to act swiftly, supportively and thoroughly when any concerns are raised. We talk to the children about how to recognise bullying using the acronym STOP (Several Times on Purpose) and if bullying happens to them to also STOP (Start Telling Other People).

If your child, or another child they know, feels they are being bullied there are lots of people in school that they can talk to, starting with their class teacher and other adults in their year group.

A local charity, Notivate, are running a song writing competition linked to this very important theme. Any anti-bullying songwriters can get involved in their own time if they wish.

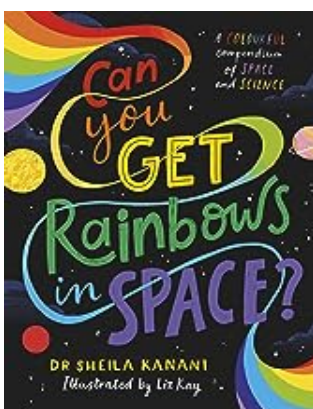
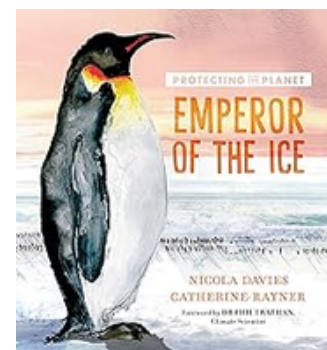


Learn about beaches and coastal life with this children’s introduction to animals, plants, and seashells.

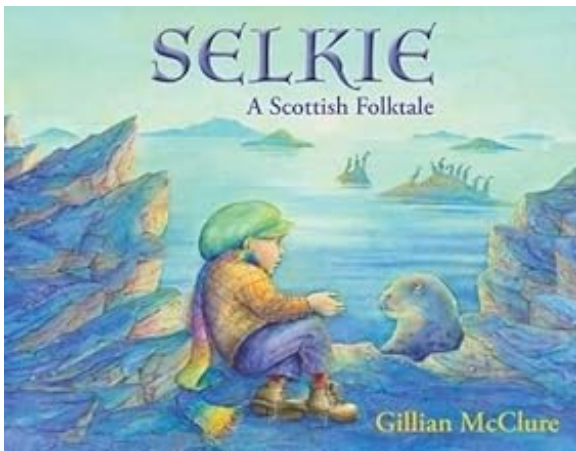

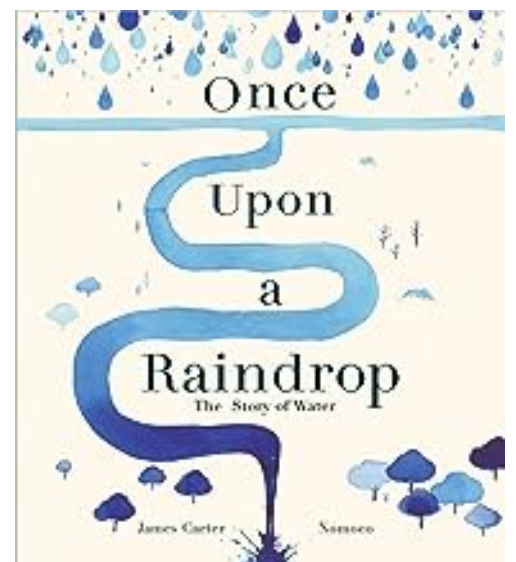

What schools need to know about CYBERBULLYING

3 KEY ASPECTS OF BULLYING BEHAVIOUR

There are three key aspects of bullying behaviour, namely that it is repetitive, negative and intentional. These behaviours apply both offline and online. Cyberbullying can almost highlight these behaviours, particularly with access to the internet available 24/7 and the different ways in which those displaying bullying behaviour online can target others. The fact that they can also easily hide their identity online can make cyberbullying much more difficult to stop.

DIFFERENT DEVICES & CHANNELS

Cyberbullying can take place over any device connected to the internet which allows for two-way communication. This includes mobile phones, tablets, computers and even games consoles as it becomes more and more common for players to chat to other players whilst playing online. From a snapshot of 1,400 students surveyed by the Diana Award in 2018, 33% of young people admitted to have experienced bullying on social media, 11% via text message and 12% whilst online gaming.

WHAT LEADS TO CYBERBULLYING

There is never any justification for cyberbullying and those who display bullying behaviour need to be held to account for their actions. Nonetheless, it can be useful to try and understand some of the factors that may lead young people into bullying behaviour. For example, family issues, personal difficulties and a lack of positive reinforcement may push some young children into bullying others as a form of coping mechanism. Similarly, those exhibiting bullying behaviour may blame their targets for provoking their behaviour in the first place or engage in bullying behaviour as a call for attention if they lack social skills or understanding. Others may view their position as dominant which makes themselves less vulnerable to being bullied or they replicate behaviour they have experienced themselves in the past.

SIGNS AND SYMPTOMS

Cyberbullying can affect anyone, at any time, at any place. The impacts of cyberbullying can be long-lasting and leave people feeling scared, anxious and lonely. Some of the more obvious signs that those experiencing bullying behaviour might show include weight loss, crying, mood changes, depression and regularly avoiding school. Other symptoms, which might be less obvious to spot and would be difficult to pick up on in isolation, may include changes in body language like hunched shoulders, walking slower or an inability to make eye-contact. In extreme cases, those experiencing bullying behaviour may have unexplained marks or scars which could be evidence of self-harm.

Tips for School Staff

TAKE A WHOLE SCHOOL APPROACH

In taking a whole approach towards cyberbullying, schools can cultivate a culture that relies on positivity and behaviour that is emulated by ALL members of the school community including staff, support staff, senior leaders, governors and parents and carers.

BUILD CONFIDENCE IN DEALING WITH INCIDENTS

This can be achieved by having clear knowledge of what constitutes bullying behaviour, having clear sanctions and courses of action and continually updating your knowledge of safety procedures regarding online and offline incidents.

USE CHILDREN AND YOUNG PEOPLE AS A RESOURCE

Ensure you understand what is influencing the behaviour of young people in your community. If schools know what their students are engaging with, it can be easier to develop and implement relevant and effective tactics / strategies to counter cyberbullying issues.

UNDERSTAND THE CAUSES OF BULLYING

As previously mentioned, sometimes those who are behind the bullying are in need of support just as much as those who are being targeted. In better understanding the cause of the issue, schools can better position themselves to tackle the problem and also adequately support both those displaying and experiencing the bullying behaviour. Taking a proactive approach means that schools can gear themselves to tackle issues specific to their school environment, rather than treating each case the same.

ENSURE ALL STAFF KNOW THEIR ROLES AND RESPONSIBILITIES

All staff have a role to play in educating and supporting children who are affected by cyberbullying, not just those responsible for safeguarding or online safety. Regular training, continuous professional development and clear school policies can help to empower staff to effectively managing any cyberbullying issues and in providing a united staff front on zero tolerance to all bullying behaviour.

Top Tips for Safer Online Shopping on BLACK FRIDAY AND CYBER MONDAY

Black Friday and Cyber Monday have become established as two of the year's biggest shopping events, giving consumers the opportunity to snap up a stash of stunning bargains. While this is, in general, good news, of course, the resultant retail frenzy can lead to people dropping their guard - especially online. In previous years, a seasonal surge in cyber-crime has seen schemes such as phishing emails and credit card scams being unleashed on unwary buyers. Our guide has some essential pointers on keeping your details - and your money - safe while you shop.

ENSURE A SITE'S SECURE

Before inputting sensitive information (like your card details) into a website, check that the site's secure. The key thing to look for is a padlock symbol in the address bar and check that the URL begins with "https://" - the "s" indicates that the web address has been encrypted with an SSL certificate. Without that, any data entered on the site could be intercepted by a third party.

SET STURDY PASSWORDS

A strong, unique password is one of the most straightforward ways to protect yourself from cyber-crime. As most of us have multiple online shopping accounts, it can be tempting to use the same password for them all - but this puts your personal details in greater risk. You could try using a password manager to create a different, robust password for each online retailer that you visit.

TRUST YOUR INSTINCTS

If a deal seems too good to be true, then it probably is. Be especially wary if a site offering unbelievable discounts doesn't have professional (for example, if it's covered with pop-up adverts or it spots numerous spelling mistakes) or serves as a red flag that the seller may not be entirely trustworthy. Minimise risk by sticking with well-known, reputable retailers instead.

REVIEW BANK STATEMENTS

Even if you're followed all our tips, it's probably worth checking your next bank statement for any unusual transactions. Criminals know that on Black Friday and Cyber Monday, lots of people make numerous purchases online, so they're hoping that any stolen money will get lost in the general flurry of transactions. If you see a payment or payment you can't identify, raise it with your bank straight away.

BWARE OF SUSPICIOUS EMAILS

Black Friday and Cyber Monday often bring a significant spike in phishing emails, so criminals use the event as a sense of urgency as cover for stealing personal information. Even if you're vigilant, be wary of spammy emails reporting you to do something unusual or suspicious, providing you access to last-minute deals, for example, or clicking on a link to an unfamiliar site.

CHECK IT'S THE REAL DEAL

It's not just cybercriminals you need to be wary of. Research has shown that some online retailers increase the price of certain items in the weeks before Black Friday and Cyber Monday - allowing "mark-up" than advertise "discounts". While, in reality, have simply restored the cost to normal levels, use an online price comparison tool to verify whether these "reductions" truly equate to a saving.

MINIMISE MICROTRANSACTIONS

Black Friday and Cyber Monday present online retailers with challenges as well as physical ones. Some gaming consoles will offer microtransactions such as loot boxes. If you're concerned about how much your child might spend on these upgrades, you can restrict their ability to make purchases (via their device's settings) or remove any linked payment methods.

DITCH THE DEBIT CARD

Where possible, it's safest to shop online with a credit card (as opposed to a debit card) because it offers additional protection. If a purchase is made irregularly on your credit card, there's a lot of checks of your bank reimbursing you. Should a retailer mislead your debit card details, however, they could empty your account in moments - and it can be difficult to recover your money.

RESIST THE INFLUENCE

Recommendations from social media influencers are another thing to remain vigilant for on Black Friday and Cyber Monday, while many of these will be legitimate, remember that you can't see the products in person, so you can't see the quality of the goods that aren't quite as striking as they appear. Be sure to read reviews from other users on their own site or elsewhere to get a better idea of everything with a critical eye.

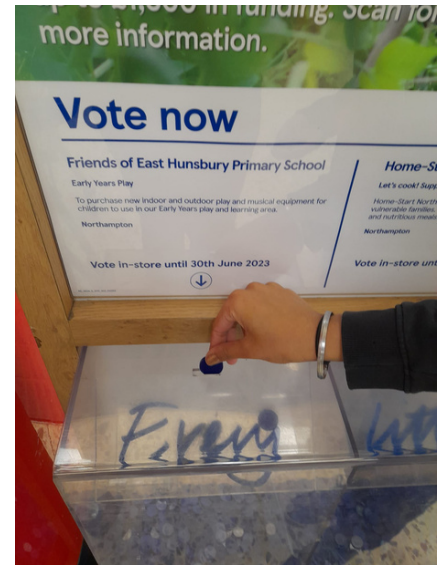
TAKE CARE ON SOCIAL MEDIA

Social media scammers are more active on Black Friday and Cyber Monday, so they know you're extra hunting for deals online. These scammers tend to concentrate on platforms such as Facebook and Instagram, posting malicious links that can entrap innocent shoppers' personal details. Other scammers, meanwhile, falsely advertise products that attempt to trick users out of their hard-earned cash.
